Special Fall Festivals Lesson

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In the dark autumn sky, the beaming moon was almost full. Below, light was glowing inside the windows of the Sanders's home. They were preparing for their big trip.

Robert, 11, and his father had just finished changing the oil in the car. As they came into the house where Robert's mother and little sister were packing the last of the clothes, Lou Ann, 9, came running up.

"Daddy, the sun set!" she said as he scooped her up with a hug. "Can we mark off another day on the Feast calendar?"

"Yes, we can," Mr. Sanders said with a smile.

The Sanders were about to keep their second Feast of Tabernacles. Robert and Lou Ann had such an exciting Feast last year that they had been looking forward to this year's festival ever since. Mrs. Sanders had drawn a big calendar decorated with pictures of fall on a large piece of construction paper. Each day had a number counting down to Opening Night. As each day passed and the sun went down, Robert and Lou Ann got to cross it off the calendar.

"Who wants to do the honors this time?" Mr. Sanders asked.

"I do! I do!" Lou Ann exclaimed. "OK, here you go," Robert said, handing her the big red marker. She went to the calendar hanging on the wall by the dining table and colored in one of the last boxes. "Only two days left!" she said.

"I can't wait till morning!" Robert said.

"It's going to be a fun road trip," Mr. Sanders said. "One day of driving and then we will be at the Feast site! The evening after that, the Feast starts!"

"You'll have lots of time to draw, color and read in the car," Mrs. Sanders said. Then she winked at Mr. Sanders and quizzed Robert, "Isn't the Feast a fun vacation?"

Robert thought for a second. "No!" he said with a smile. "It's not a vacation. But it is fun!"

Mr. Sanders laughed. "Good, Robert. The Feast isn't a vacation. It's a very special holy festival."

"Like Atonement?" Lou Ann asked. The Sanders had just kept Atonement two days ago and the Feast of Trumpets several days before that.

“Yes,” Mr. Sanders said, “the Feast of Tabernacles is the next festival on God’s calendar. It’s not a vacation—it’s better! Like the other holy days, it teaches us something specific about God and His awesome plan for human beings.”

“Each of the seven festivals teaches us about a step in God’s plan,” Mr. Sanders said as the family sat down in the living room to finish packing their suits, dresses, play clothes, and other belongings they would need on their trip. “Most people don’t know about God’s holy days,” he said. “That’s why they don’t understand God or His plan for everyone.”

“But they’ll know about the holy days soon, right?” Robert asked.

“Yes,” Mr. Sanders said as he packed a pair of binoculars and nudged his son. “Somebody was paying attention last Feast!”

THE PURPOSE OF GOD’S HOLY DAYS

The Sanders family was getting ready to keep the Feast of Tabernacles because they were obeying God. Thousands of years ago, God commanded that His people keep seven annual festivals: Passover, feast of Unleavened Bread, Pentecost, Feast of Trumpets, Day of Atonement, Feast of Tabernacles and Last Great Day (Leviticus 23).

The first three of these festivals occur in the spring. They show how God plans to bring a small group of people into His Family to become God beings. This group is known as the Bride of Christ.

The last four of these festivals occur in the fall. They show how God plans to bring everyone else into His Family. These people will become the children of Christ and His Bride.

In this lesson, you will learn along with Robert and Lou Ann Sanders the meanings of the four fall festivals: the Feast of Trumpets, Day of Atonement, Feast of Tabernacles and Last Great Day.

WHY PEOPLE NEED GOD’S HOLY DAYS

“I have some extra snacks,” Mrs. Sanders said as she brought out a plate. “You’ll have the rest of these tomorrow, right about the time we cross the state line.”

“Thanks, Mom,” Robert said. “I love turkey wraps! I can’t wait to go to restaurants at the Feast! The first thing I’m going to have is a *big* cheeseburger,” he said as he licked his lips in anticipation.

“The Feast is about good food, good activities and good conversations,” Mr. Sanders said. “Why does God command that we enjoy good things and rejoice at the Feast?”

“Because of the Millennium?” Lou Ann asked.

“That’s right,” Mr. Sanders replied. “At the Feast we enjoy extra time to learn about God and to talk with people in God’s Church. We even have abundant money to share nice meals and to go to exciting activities. This is to show us how happy and how abundant God’s way of life is. When Jesus Christ

returns, the Feast will be fulfilled. It will be 1,000 years—a millennium—of people being happy.”

“Why aren’t people happy now?” Robert asked. “Everyone likes to be happy. So why aren’t they?”

“It’s because they don’t know how,” Mrs. Sanders said.

“People think they know how to be happy, but they don’t!” Mr. Sanders said. “The very first people, Adam and Eve, disobeyed God and sinned. They tried to be happy by living their own way, as influenced by Satan. And everyone since then has done the same thing. When you and I sin, we do the same thing. Without God’s instruction, humans just don’t know how to be happy. We *want* to be. God *made* us to be, but if we don’t listen to God and obey Him, we *can’t* be happy! Just look around you and watch the news.”

Lou Ann’s face conveyed a tinge of grief. She had recently seen parts of the evening news, an unending list of sadness that was hard to watch: mixed-up families, leaders lying, young people rioting, robberies, shootings, a terror alert, orphaned children, murders and war.

“Sometimes you fight with your brother,” Mrs. Sanders said gently. “You think you are right and he is wrong. Or you are purely being selfish. He does the same thing. Adults do that too.”

“The Feast helps us see what the world will be like when God takes over,” Mr. Sanders said. “Even though we still

live in a world where everyone is rebelling against God, the Feast is like a time machine that takes us to the future. In the Millennium, everyone will be happy because they will be living the way their Creator made them to live!”

“It won’t be too long until the Millennium, will it, Daddy?” Lou Ann asked.

“After Adam and Eve rebelled against God, He gave human beings 6,000 years to continue doing the same thing,” Mr. Sanders explained. “These 6,000 years are almost up! Then we will have 1,000 years of doing things *God’s* way!”

REVIEWING THE SPRING HOLY DAYS

“When Jesus Christ returns, will He help everyone learn to be happy all by Himself?” Mrs. Sanders asked Robert.

“No, He will have the Church,” Robert answered.

“Passover represents the first step in God’s plan,” Mr. Sanders said. “All human beings—except one—have sinned. You have been selfish and sinned; I have; everyone has. Because we have sinned, we have

earned the penalty of death. Everyone lives; everyone sins; and everyone dies.”

“That’s so hopeless!” Lou Ann blurted out.

“Yes, it would be,” Mrs. Sanders said, “if it wasn’t for Jesus Christ!”

“Jesus Christ was a God Being, but He chose to become a human being,” said Mr. Sanders. “He lived a human life, just like you and me, except He *never* sinned. Because He is our Creator and because He never sinned, His death pays for all of our sins.”

“So now we don’t have to die forever,” Robert told Lou Ann.

“If you repent and strive to follow God, your sins can be forgiven,” said her father. “The fact that Jesus Christ died for us, makes the next step in God’s plan possible. What’s the next step?”

“The feast of Unleavened Bread!” Lou Ann exclaimed. “I like Mom’s butterhorns best!”

“Your mother does make us delicious treats that week,” Mr. Sanders said, smiling at his wife. “Why does she do that?”

“Because we can’t eat leavening,” Robert answered.

“That’s right,” Mrs. Sanders said. “Leavening is like sin. Leavening puffs up bread with gas, and sin puffs up people with pride. Unleavened bread is like Jesus Christ.”

“How is that?” Robert asked.

“Because unleavened bread is flat and dense, full of substance and not air,” his mother answered. “Jesus Christ was like

that in the sense that He was sincere, truthful and humble.”

“So Passover means that Christ died for our sins and the feast of Unleavened Bread means we have to stop sinning and be like Him,” Robert said.

“Almost right,” Mr. Sanders said. “Christ died for our past sins. But we are not strong enough to just stop sinning on our own. That’s why we have Pentecost. That is the third festival, and it shows us that God’s people need the power of His Holy Spirit to help them overcome sin and live like Jesus Christ.”

“The Holy Spirit is also what God uses to bring us into His Family as His children,” Mrs. Sanders said.

“But God didn’t call people into His Church just so they could become God beings first, before everybody else,” said Mr. Sanders. “People in God’s Church who are getting ready to be born into His Family have an important role to play in the next step of God’s plan!”

MOST IMPORTANT EVENT IN HISTORY

“What is the next step of God’s plan, the next festival of the year?” Mrs. Sanders asked as the family began to pack their final items and get the suitcases ready to take out to the car.

“The Feast of Trumpets!” said Lou Ann. “We kept Trumpets two weeks ago.”

“Yes, the Feast of Trumpets is the first of the four fall festivals,” Mr. Sanders said. “God first commanded this festival for the Israelites in the Old Testament. He told them to blow an instrument at the start of this festival; it’s made from a ram’s horn and is called a *shofar*.”

“Wasn’t that an alarm?” Robert asked.

“Yes,” replied his father. “What was it an alarm for?”

“I think it’s a war alarm. But isn’t Trumpets about Jesus Christ returning? Why are people having a war if Christ is coming back?”

“That’s a tragic thing,” Mrs. Sanders said. “You are completely right: Trumpets pictures Christ’s return, and it also pictures a war. The reason is that when Jesus Christ returns, most people will be angry at Him. He will be returning to become the King of the whole world. “They can try,” Mr. Sanders said. “And they will try. But even the most powerful

army you can imagine can’t even come close to destroying Christ—He is a God Being!”

“They will be in the middle of a war already,” Mrs. Sanders said. “The Bible says everyone on Earth will be suffering as huge armies try to destroy each other. If Christ did not come to Earth to stop this gigantic war, human beings would end up killing every person and animal on Earth!”

“What will happen to us in the war?” Lou Ann asked, wide-eyed.

“Sweetie, we can’t do anything to protect ourselves,” Mr. Sanders said, “but God can! God promises to take His people to a place of safety. He will protect us there. Then, when Christ returns, those who have God’s Holy Spirit in them will be transformed into spirit beings. “The Day of Atonement shows us that we are just tiny human beings and that we need humble, teachable attitudes to be close to God,” Mr. Sanders said. That’s why we spent extra time praying and studying the Bible on Atonement. Atonement is all about human beings learning to be at one with God.”

“And for that to happen, Satan has to be taken away,” Robert said.

“Good, Robert!” Mrs. Sanders said. “Atonement also pictures Satan being

"Good," Mr. Sanders said. "The Millennium is a period of time that lasts for 1,000 years. It begins at the return of Jesus Christ to Earth."

"Why is the Feast only seven days long?" asked Robert. "I wish it lasted seven weeks!"

"In ancient Israel, wedding feasts lasted seven days," Mr. Sanders explained. "The Feast of Tabernacles represents the wedding feast of Christ and the Church, so it also lasts seven days."

"I didn't know the Feast was about Jesus Christ's wedding," said Lou Ann.

"Yes," said Mrs. Sanders. "After Christ returns, He will marry the Church. Then Christ and His Bride will teach everyone on Earth about God's way of life for 1,000 years."

"That's right," Mrs. Sanders said. "The Bible talks about wolves, leopards and lions in the Millennium; they'll lie down next to lambs, goats and calves."


"Instead of eating them," Robert said.
