he world had turned to evil once again. After Nimrod and Semiramis, there was a man named Abram. God planned to use Abram to become one of the most important men in history.

When Abram was 75 years old, God began to call him. He instructed Abram to leave his home in Haran and to journey to the land of Canaan. After this, God spoke to Abram again and told him to look in every direction from where he was standing. God said that all this land would belong to him and his many, many descendants.

About 20 years later, Abram still did not have any children, and he and Sarai were now very old. God spoke to Abram once again and changed his name from Abram to Abraham, which means "father of many nations." God also changed his wife's name to Sarah, which means "princess." God repeated His promise that Abraham and Sarah would have a son. He told them to name him Isaac.

Around this time, three individuals approached Abraham's tent. They appeared to be men, but two of them were angels and one of them was God! Abraham invited these men to rest in the shade and eat. The men told Abraham that Sarah would give birth to a boy within a year. They also told him that God was going to destroy the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah because of their wickedness.

The two angels went to Lot's home to warn him about God's punishment on Sodom and Gomorrah. Evil men of Sodom saw the visitors enter Lot's house and tried to break in to attack them. But the angels struck these men with blindness and told Lot and his family to run away from the city. When they hesitated, the angels grabbed their hands and led them away from the cities, warning them not to look back.

But Lot's wife loved her home and the city, even though it was full of evil. She disobeyed and looked back. God punished her by turning her into a pillar of salt. He recorded this in the Bible as a lesson for us to obey God and do exactly what He says.

"Lay not your hand upon the lad," God said, "neither do you any thing to him: for now I know that you fear God, seeing that you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me."
